A Happy Face, A Learning Place, A Growing Space



Easter Assembly – Father Burton

On Monday we welcomed Father Andrew Burton from the St. Peter's Church in Bushey Heath. He read the children in KS1 a three part Easter story, beginning with Good Friday.
