

Tuesday 6th February marked Safer Internet Day. We held an assembly for the children and learnt about the importance of being safe when using the internet. We found out that no one really owns the internet so we cannot trust everything we see on there. The children know that filters stop them from seeing things that they should not but if they do see something, they must tell an adult they trust straight away. Sometimes when we play games other people might

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try and talk to us and ask for our personal information. We know that this is not OK and we keep our personal information to ourselves, especially our names, address and the name of our school. 'Collaborative Learners' – our place in the world

Tu B'Shevat

Rabbi Sharfstein visited our school last week to lead an assembly on Tu B'Shevat, the festival of trees. The children discussed the fact that every year trees grow and get bigger and stronger. Just like us, they need water and nourishment. As they suck this up from the soil the tree produces sap which spreads the nourishment around the tree and helps it to grow, get stronger and, in some cases, produce more fruit. Tu B'Shevat celebrates the fact that trees are not sleeping during winter, rather they are working hard at spreading sap around the tree to help them grow and get stronger through the rest of the year. Rabbi Sharfstein taught the children that the 3 fruits that are often eaten during this festival by the Jewish community are pomegranate, dates and grapes.
