New Early Years Curriculum

Welcome to our Outstanding Early Years Curriculum at Merry Hill.

Our approach is guided by four overarching principles:

- Every child is unique,
- Positive relationships,
- · Enabling environments,
- · Learning and development.

These principles ensure a nurturing and stimulating environment for our youngest learners.

We cover seven areas of learning and development, each with specific Early Learning Goals. These areas are divided into Prime and Specific areas.

Prime areas include:

Communication and Language (CL)
Personal, Social, and Emotional Development (PSED)
Physical Development (PD)

Specific areas include:

Literacy (L)
Mathematics (M)
Understanding the World (UW)
Expressive Arts and Design (EAD)

In 2021, changes were made to the wording of our educational programmes. These updates include more in-depth descriptions and examples of activities to enhance early language skills and extend vocabulary.

Our assessment process includes the Reception Baseline Assessment (RBA) and continuous assessment against the 17 Early Learning Goals. Teachers draw on their expert judgement without the need for extensive documentation, ensuring more interaction and less paperwork.

We also focus on the Characteristics of Effective Learning:

- Playing and exploring
- Active learning
- Creating and thinking critically

Safeguarding is paramount, including promoting good health and oral health among our children.

At Merry Hill, our Early Years Curriculum supports every child's journey, nurturing their growth and development from Nursery through Reception.


Our Ambitious Curriculum is uniquely tailored to each cohort of children.

- All children will consistently use good manners, promoting kindness and respect in their interactions.

At Merry Hill, our goal is to create well-rounded, ambitious learners who are prepared to thrive in an ever-changing world.



Reception Hours:

Morning Session: 8:45am - 11:45am

(Door opens early for a 'soft start' to the day at 8:45am)

Lunch Break: 11:45am - 12:45pm Afternoon Session: 12:45pm - 3:15pm

It's crucial to arrive on time at the start of the school day. This helps children develop good timekeeping habits and minimizes classroom disruption. The gates and outside doors lock at 8:55am, and any children arriving after this time must be accompanied by an adult as entry is via the school office.

Rolling Snack:

In line with our healthy eating policy, children are provided with fruit or vegetables daily. They can choose when to have their snack during the session. Please do not send biscuits, crisps, sweets, or any other items as substitutes, as these are not allowed. Nuts and chocolate should never be brought to school.

Milk is available at a small charge for those who would like it and is free for children who are still four years old at the end of each term. Milk must be ordered and paid for via our online payment system before the start of each term. Water is available for those who dislike milk. Please do not send cartons of drink as an alternative. Your child may also bring a bottle of water to school that they will have access to all day.

E-Safety:

Information Communication Technology (ICT), including the internet, email, and mobile

technologies, has become an important part of learning in our school. We expect all children to be safe and responsible when using any ICT. Please read and complete the ICT agreement with the rest of your admission documents.

Health and Absence from School:

If your child has to miss school, it is important that you inform us of the reason. Please explain all absences as soon as possible by telephone, in writing, by email to admin@merryhill.herts.sch.uk, or in person. If you do not do this, the absence will be noted as 'unauthorised'.

Most absences are for good reasons and will generally be authorised by the school if they are due to:

Sickness/unavoidable medical or dental appointments

Days of religious observance

The following reasons for absence will not be authorised:

Shopping during school hours

Birthday celebrations

Holidays - Parents are strongly urged not to book family holidays during term time. At Merry Hill, we follow the Health Protection Agency guidelines which state that children should not return to school for a full 48 hours from the last episode of diarrhoea or vomiting (48 Hour Rule).

What should your child bring to school?

- Book bag- please no backpacks and only 1 keyring
- Coat with a hood (even if it looks like a nice day)
- Sun hat
- PE kit
- Wellies
- Glue Stick

Please name all items so we can return them to you if lost Please do not bring toys to school

Water Bottles:

Please send this in each day filled with regular water – not flavoured.

What to Bring to School:

Book Bag: Please ensure your child has a book bag with a key ring attached to help identify it. Only one key ring per bag, please. Available on Scopay

Raincoat: Children should leave a raincoat with a hood in school in case of rain, even on the brightest of days.

Glue Stick: Available on Scopay.

PE Kit: Includes a white shirt, black shorts, plimsolls, spare socks, underwear, and a change of uniform.

Water Bottles: Please send this in each day filled with regular water – not flavoured. Water bottles should not have tops that can be removed to drink from, as this can cause wet puddles on the carpet.

Coat: Even if it looks like a nice day, please ensure your child brings a coat to school.

Wellies: Especially for outdoor activities or rainy days.

Please Name All Items: This helps us return them to you if they are lost. Please show your child what their wellies and raincoat look like to help them in finding them.

Note: Please do not allow your child to bring toys to school.

Lunchtime



At our school, we believe that a nourishing meal is essential for a successful day of learning. That's why we take great pride in offering a variety of delicious options for lunchtime.

From hearty vegetarian dishes to flavourful non-vegetarian meals, our school dinners are prepared fresh on-site, ensuring quality and taste in every bite. With a focus on providing balanced nutrition, each meal includes a choice of vegetables alongside the main course, accompanied by fresh fruit and a homemade shortbread biscuit—the children's favourite treat.

If you choose not to have a school dinner, you can provide your child with a packed lunch from home. In line with our healthy eating policy, we kindly ask that packed lunches exclude fizzy drinks, nuts, chocolate, or sweets. Please ensure the packed lunch is in a clearly named lunch box.



We prioritize the holistic development of our students. We're proud to introduce the Jigsaw PSHE programme—a comprehensive framework integrating personal, social, health, and education.

Through Jigsaw, we foster self-esteem, positive behaviour, and healthy relationships. It's a whole-school approach, with all year groups exploring the same theme simultaneously, promoting continuity and progression. Each week, we celebrate a theme from the Jigsaw lesson, encouraging reflection and application of learning. At Merry Hill, Jigsaw isn't just a curriculum—it's a journey towards confident, resilient students."

Therapeutic Approaches to Behaviour





At Merry Hill we adopt the Hertfordshire therapeutic thinking behaviour approach. We recognise that every behaviour is a form of communication. If a child seems unsettled, we delve into the underlying reasons, striving to understand their emotions and provide tailored support to help them regulate and settle. Our approach emphasizes positive reinforcement, with verbal praise highlighting how a child's actions positively impact others or make us feel. Additionally, we're proud to have two dedicated Tutors at Merry Hill, enriching our commitment to supporting every child's emotional well-being.

The Behaviour Curriculum





Recent government guidance has emphasised the need for schools to develop a behaviour curriculum. There is an inseparable link between teaching and learning and behaviour. To help children and young people succeed we believe that we, as educators, must teach rather than tell. As a result, our 'Behaviour Curriculum' goes beyond the behaviour policy, it identifies the behaviour and skills we expect each child to master at each age and stage. This curriculum defines each skill and how it can be taught, including the methodology for monitoring and recognising progress. Where there are identified gaps planned interventions will be used to close these gaps; these

interventions will be age and stage appropriate.

Additionally, we empower children with the three-step approach to address situations they don't like:

First, they assert, 'Stop, I don't like it.'

If the behaviour persists, they warn, 'Stop, or I will tell an adult.'

Finally, they confidently inform an adult about the issue, ensuring their concerns are addressed promptly and effectively.



At Merry Hill, we instil the importance of The Merry Hill Way in every aspect of school life. These rules are simple yet profound and apply to all aspects of school life:

By discussing and referring to these rules consistently, we create a culture where inclusion, responsibility, resilience and communication (out values) are not just encouraged but ingrained in everything we do.



Outdoor learning is an integral part of our curriculum at Merry Hill, and we embrace it in all weather conditions. Rain or shine, we venture outdoors every day, immersing ourselves in nature's classroom.

Additionally, we have dedicated sessions as Mini Forest Explorers at least once a week, where children delve deeper into outdoor exploration and discovery.

To ensure your child fully enjoys these experiences, we kindly ask that you provide them with a pair of wellies, clearly labelled with their name, to keep at school. A waterproof coat is also essential for their comfort and enjoyment of outdoor activities.

At Merry Hill, we believe that outdoor learning offers invaluable opportunities for growth, creativity, and connection with the natural world, enriching our educational journey in meaningful ways.

Physical Education (PE)




At Merry Hill, we prioritize physical education as an integral part of our curriculum, with dedicated PE sessions taking place every Friday. These sessions are designed to engage children in a variety of activities, including gymnastics, where they can explore movement and coordination.

Safety is paramount during physical activities, which is why we ask children with long hair, whether boys or girls, to tie it back securely. Additionally, earrings are covered with tape to prevent any accidents or discomfort.

Encouraging independence is a fundamental aspect of our educational approach. Getting changed for PE is not only about preparing for physical activity but also about fostering responsibility and organization. We encourage parents to help children locate their names on their clothes and shoes, promoting a sense of ownership and accountability.

At Merry Hill, we view PE as more than just exercise; it's an opportunity for children to develop essential life skills such as independence, responsibility, and organisation, setting them up for success both inside and outside the classroom.



Phonics is a fundamental part of our daily curriculum at Merry Hill, with dedicated lessons taking place every day. For some children who may benefit from additional support, we offer small group phonics interventions to further enhance their learning experience.

We proudly adhere to the Essential Letters and Sounds programme, a comprehensive approach designed to foster strong phonetic skills in our students.

Central to our phonics teaching is the concept of pure sounds, where children learn to articulate phonetic sounds accurately and distinctly.

To aid in this process, we provide resources and guidance for parents, including access to the Oxford Pure Sounds website for further practice and reinforcement at home.

In addition to daily phonics lessons, we also send home challenging words that may be more difficult to read and spell.

Regular assessment ensures that we can identify any areas where children may require extra support, and we will promptly communicate with parents if such assistance is needed.

As part of our commitment to parental involvement, we encourage parents to engage with their child's reading journey by providing insight into the reading books sent home each week.

We explain the purpose behind having three books in their bags and outline the expectations for using the reading diary to facilitate ongoing communication and support between home and school.




At Merry Hill, literacy takes centre stage with daily lessons aimed at nurturing a love for language and communication.

Through a rich variety of activities, both indoors and outdoors, children are encouraged to explore the world of mark-making using diverse media such as chalk, pencil, paint, and even tracing in glitter or printing in playdough.

From the earliest stages, children are provided with ample opportunities to write their names, gradually progressing to word and sentence formation. Our focus extends to refining fundamental skills such as letter formation and correct pencil grip, laying a strong foundation for future writing endeavours.

Through daily literacy lessons infused with creativity and engagement, we aim to inspire a lifelong passion for language and literacy in every child at Merry Hill.



At Merry Hill, mathematics is not just a subject but a daily adventure filled with discovery and practical exploration. We follow the Mastering Number Program. Our maths lessons, led by knowledgeable adults, provide a stimulating environment where children engage with numbers in meaningful ways.

We begin by laying a strong foundation, focusing on essential concepts such as number bonds to 5, gradually progressing to numbers up to 10. Through hands-on activities and games, children learn to quickly recognise amounts without counting, known as subitising.

Counting accurately is another crucial skill we cultivate, extending our reach to numbers beyond 20. Our approach emphasises experiential learning, allowing children to immerse themselves in mathematical concepts through play and exploration.

From measuring and weighing to sorting and counting, every activity is designed to ignite curiosity and build confidence in mathematical thinking.

With daily doses of mathematical adventure, we aim to instil in our young learners a love for numbers and a solid mathematical foundation to carry them forward.

Reading



- 1. Phonetic Development
- 2. Book Band
- 3. Library Book (your child chooses this book)
- 4. Reading Record



Reading is a vital part of your child's development, and at Merry Hill, we're committed to nurturing their love for it. Each week, your child will bring home two reading books:

The first book will be carefully selected to support their phonetic development, ensuring it is 100% decodable. This book is designed to help your child practice their phonics skills and build confidence in reading.

The second book will be book-banded, providing a varied range of reading material suited to your child's level.

At the beginning of Reception, children will start with a book containing no words, aimed at reinforcing pre-reading skills. As they become more proficient, they will progress to books with text.

We value your input and encourage you to share any comments or observations about your child's reading progress in their home/school reading record and ask that you record 3 entries each week.

Additionally, your child will have the opportunity to borrow a library book each week for you to enjoy together.

We believe in the importance of daily reading for pleasure, so we encourage you to read to your child regularly, allowing them to choose a text they find enjoyable.

Don't forget to jot down your thoughts and experiences in their reading record.

The Friends of Merry Hill is a dedicated group of parents, teachers, and community members who work together to support our school and enhance the educational experience of our children.


The FoMH organises various fundraising events, such as bake sales, fun runs, and school fairs, to raise funds for school projects, equipment, and extracurricular activities.



At Merry Hill, the safety and wellbeing of your child are our top priorities. We encourage open communication between home and school to ensure we can provide the best support possible for your child.


Please keep us informed of any changes in routines or circumstances that may affect your child's wellbeing.

Keep children off school for at least 48 hours after the last attack of vomiting of diarrhoea (If they are just under the weather please send them in and we will let you know if they need to be collected. Attendance is expected – 96% attendance is expected.

Children who attend regularly settle more easily and make better progress.

Clothes for outdoor learning. No such thing as unsuitable weather just unsuitable clothing.

Suncream cannot be shared and the child eeds to apply it to themselves Access to water in all classes

Eveything needs to be named.

Please greet you child with a friendly face rather than being on your phone. No phone use on school premises.

You will be given an opportunity to join a whatsapp group if you want to. Please be mindful of our e safety agreement. The school and the pupils and staff should not be brough into disrepute. Please just come and speak to us if you have any issues.

I know what is happening as my teacher goes through the visual timetable everyday.










If I have a school dinner I collect it from here.

Depending on the dinner I have chosen I wear a green, blue, yellow, purple or red wristband. I show the dinner staff my band and they give me my dinner.

I sit with my friends to eat my lunch. The teachers and Learning Support Assistants LSAs) help me if I need someone to cut up my food.
